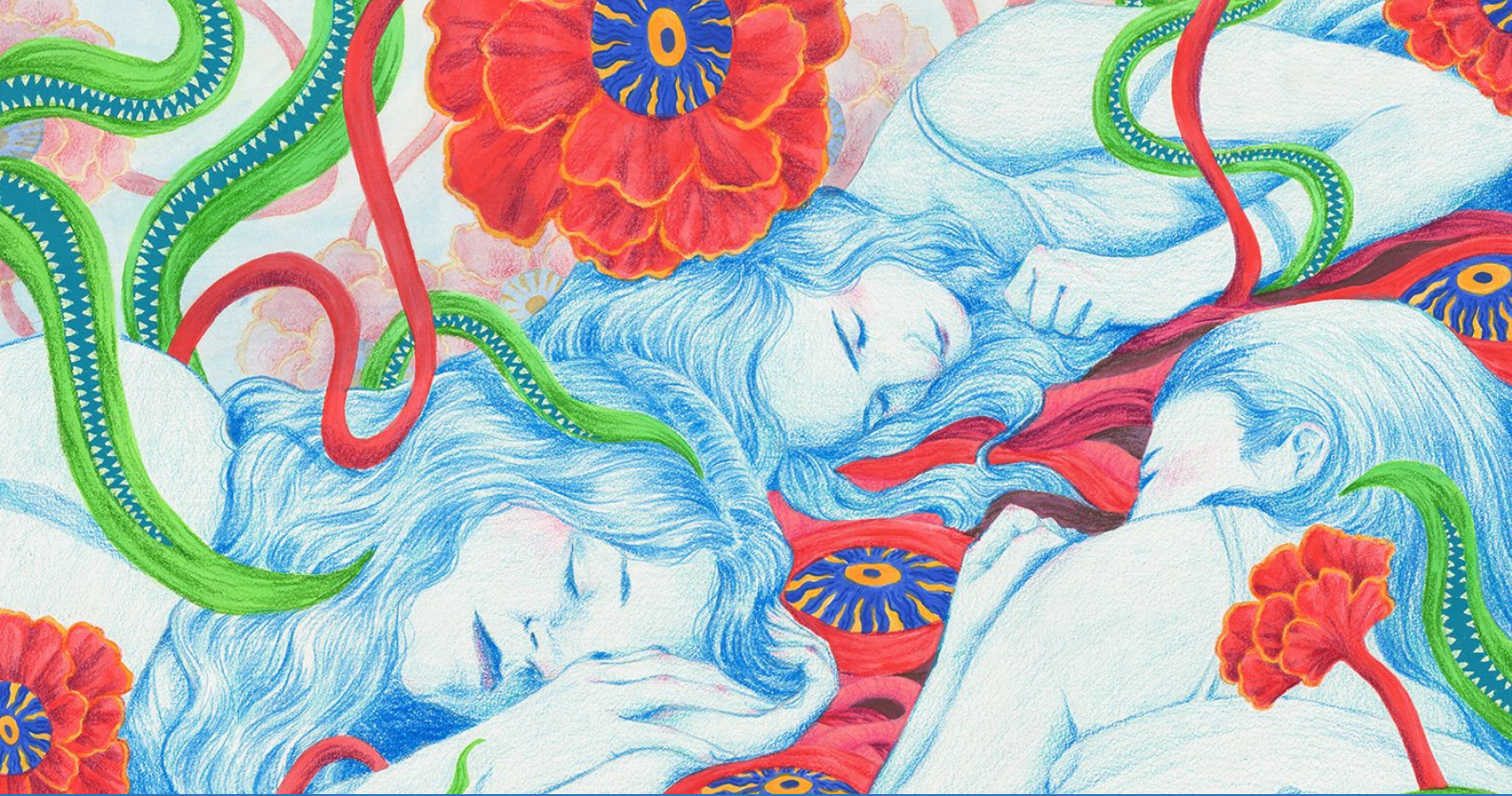

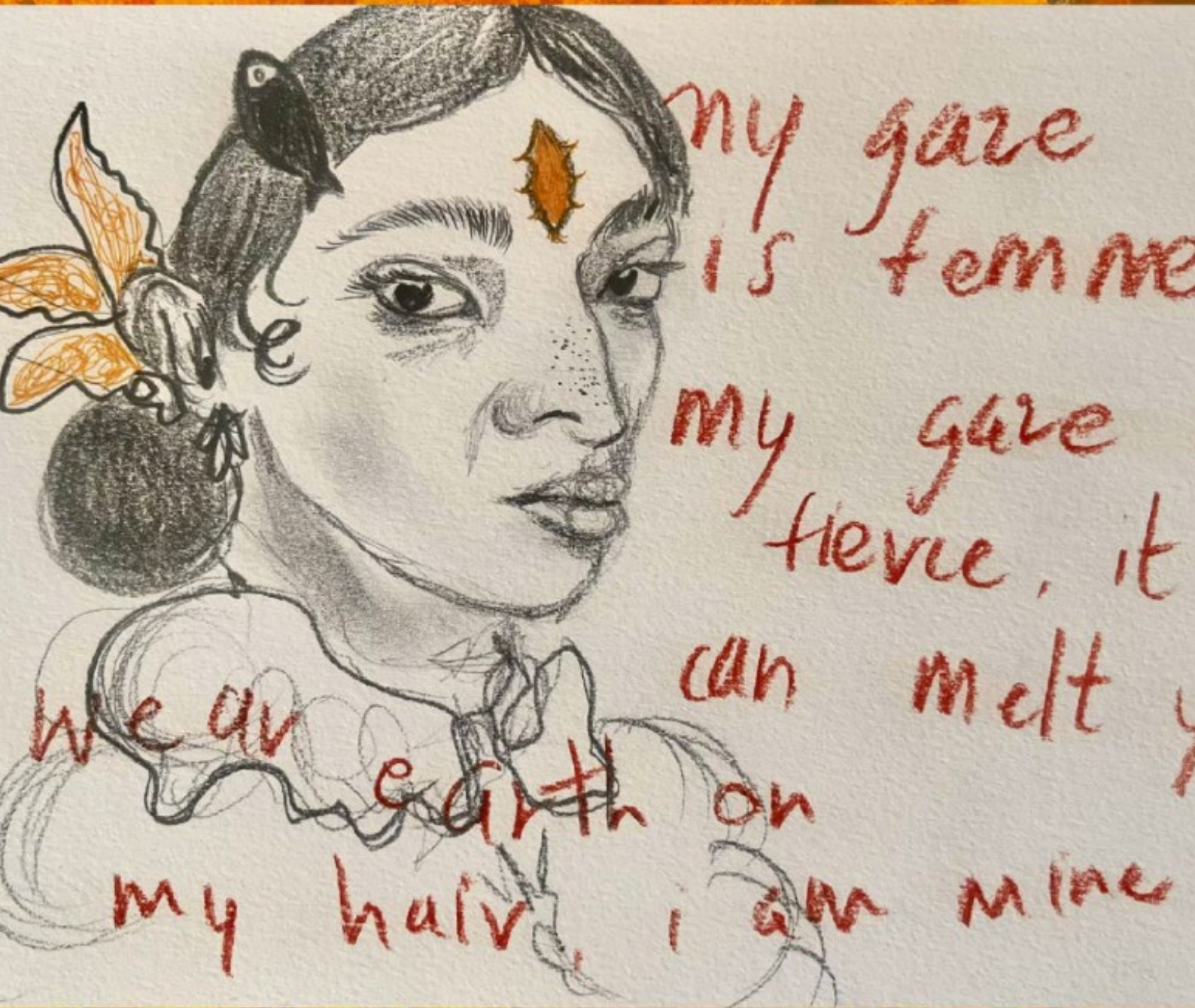

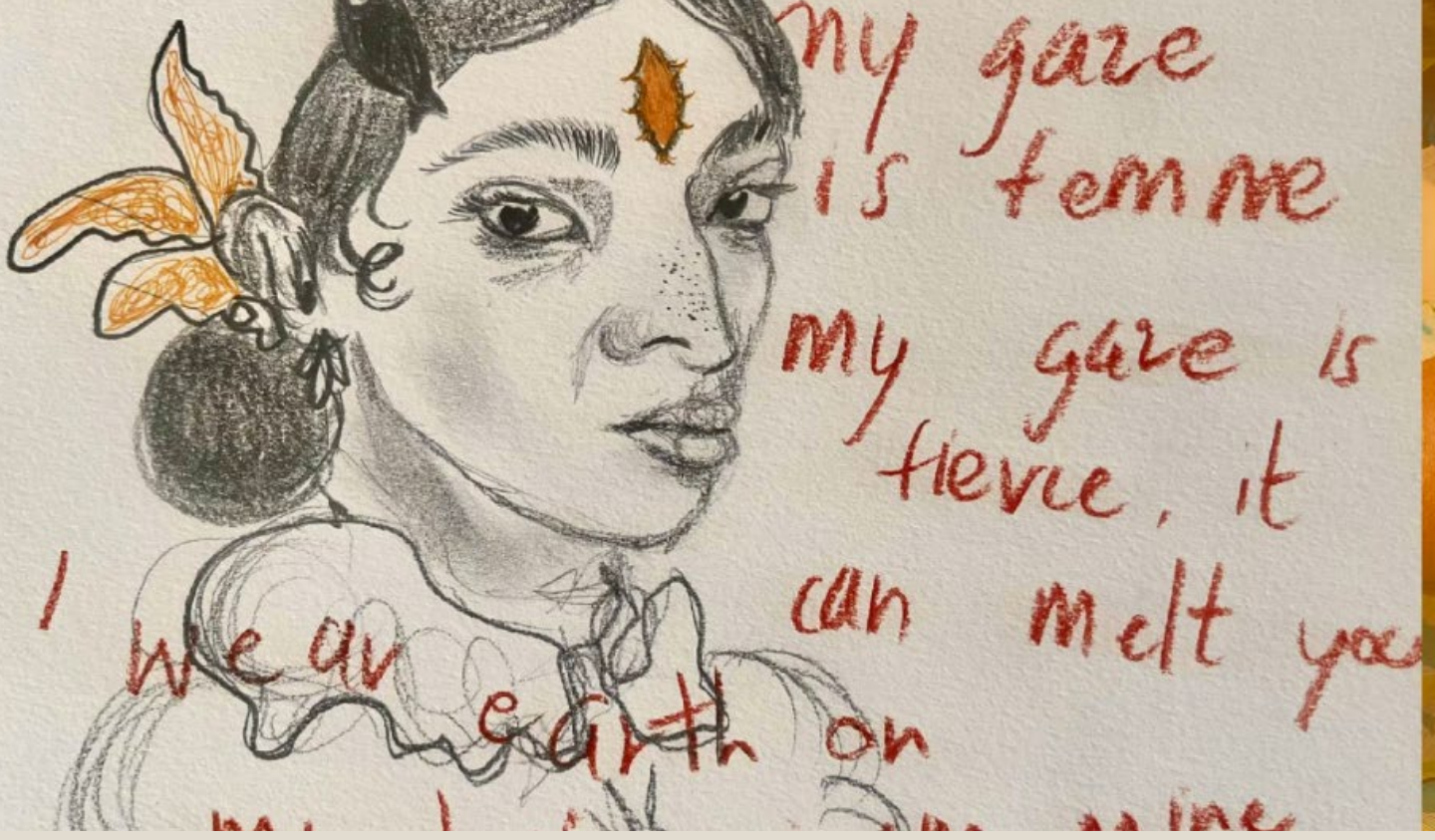

Ana’s digital illustration practice encompasses a wide range of techniques, from mixed digital illustration to painting, allowing her to explore diverse creative fields including advertising, print, and editorial. Her work is characterized by bold, vibrant colors combined with expressive ink lines, often inspired by the experiences, aspirations, and identities of Caribbean women. Her art has been featured in international publications, and she continues to advocate for the representation, empowerment, and well-being of Caribbean women. Currently, Ana is in the process of writing her first feature film.



PARMU CHRISTINE NDIMUSIIMA, UGANDA

Parmu Christine Ndimusiima is a visual artist with great passion in painting and sculpting. She was born in Hoima district and grew up in Kampala. Christine pursued a bachelor of art and industrial design at Kyambogo University. She is an artist who works actively and understands the arts to be an innovative way to learn about the world and each other. Art has always been a form of expression and elevating nature telling stories through compositions and being able to denote messages through imagination. Each piece she creates is an extension from the past. Her works communicate about social issues as well as the culture of Africa and the indigenous African materials.



CITA FARANI, INDONESIA

Cita has only recently rediscovered her passion for creating works that allow her to pour her feelings and beliefs. Her final project “Unbinding” for an intensive art course, which marked the beginning of her art journey, was featured in Capable Craft’s 2024 top 30. Her next painting “Dream for a Dream” was featured in the Asmaraloka Chapter Two group exhibition. Earlier in the same year, she contributed her illustrations in two zines, So to Speak Journal and Archive of the Odd.



JIAYI ZHOU, CHINA

Jiayi Zhou is a local deaf artist and currently living in Shanghai, China. Art is her first language as she became deaf at an early age. She graduated from Gallaudet University in the USA, receiving a double Bachelor of Arts in Graphic Design and Studio Art 2D. She later pursued a Master’s Program in International Development, with specific focus on art and disability. Jiayi hosted several solo exhibitions in both China and America, as well as participated in various group exhibitions. Besides that, Jiayi conducted art workshops including printmaking workshops, creative craft workshops for kids of deaf adults (KODA) group, and different art workshops for people with/without disabilities.



KOKILA BHATTACHARYA, INDIA

Kokila Bhattacharya is a feminist artist and activist from Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh, India. Her work, spanning illustration, advocacy and writing, critically engages with social justice themes, particularly gender, LGBTQIA+ rights, and environmental issues. Kokila has organized protests and driven collective actions around human rights issues. Her body of work emphasizes the interconnectedness of gender, caste, and corporate crimes, including her ongoing efforts to document post-capitalist struggles in India. The art is a medium and commentary on societal norms, aiming to inspire empathy, solidarity, and resistance.



KONKE YENI, SOUTH AFRICA

My name is Konke Yeni. I am an artist based in Cape Town, SA. For many years I have specialized in portrait sketches, but I have since ventured onto abstract painting and digital art. My work is inspired by everyday life happening around me, from nature to illnesses to people finding ways to live fully. I would love for people to be able to see what I see through my work. My art style is chaotic, but cogitative! I like to create a sense of depth that we can all identify with by working with mixed media, creating all kinds of textures.



LANA KHASKIA, PALESTINE

Lana Khaskia was born in al-Tireh, occupied Palestine 1948 and currently works as a farmer and horticulture teacher. Embroidery has always served meditative and therapeutic roles for her, acting as a means of connecting memories to the present through needle and thread. During the Gaza genocide, she began exploring how this medium could directly express suffering and the atrocities of war.



LUCIA MURRAY, ANTIGUA & BARBUDA

Lucia Murray - also known as LEM - is a burgeoning, multidisciplinary artist and writer living and pursuing their practice in Antigua & Barbuda. They practice both traditional art and digital art - with their pieces primarily taking the form of acrylic paintings, pen and pencil illustrations, digital paintings, and digital drawings.



MARIYEH MUSHTAQ, KASHMIR

Mariyeh Mushtaq is a feminist organiser and artist from Kashmir. Her work is located at the intersection of art, academia, and activism. She practices her art through the visual dissemination of feminist knowledge, prompting the readers to think about the issues that concern the world (both her world and the world out there). Addressing themes of gender, space, conflict, memory, social movements, resistance, and women's activism; she makes use of contemporary surrealism through mixed-media illustrations, digital collage and photography. Kashmir Pop Art is her creative project about Kashmiri people, places, history, politics and culture narrated through a feminist visual lens.



PILAR EMITXIN, ARGENTINA

Illustrator and activist. Graphic designer from Córdoba, Argentina. I received my professional training both at the university and in the streets and in popular and feminist assemblies. I specialize in political graphics for organizations and NGOs, particularly feminist, internationalist and territorial defenders. I am a graphic designer from the global South, within the framework of a generation where structural precariousness and war are the structural signs of our life experience.



PREENA NAIDU, UK/INDIA

I am currently a Digital Communications Intern for the Gender Programme at ODI, a global affairs think tank in London. I help create and manage digital content across social platforms, bringing light to crucial gender norms issues. My experience spans content creation and marketing strategies, shaped by my MSc in Gender, Media, and Culture from LSE. Before London, I worked with the YP Foundation to launch their Masculinities Programme in Delhi and contributed to Mumbai's intersectional and queer publications like Gaysi Family. Additionally, I sold feminist artwork back home in Mumbai, grounding my professional journey in creative, inclusive storytelling and advocacy for gender equality.



SALOMEYA BAUER, GEORGIA

Salomeya Bauer is a queer activist and independent multidisciplinary artist. Displaced from Georgia in the early 90s due to the Civil War, she returned in 2014 and fully devoted herself to the art as a documentation of reality. She is a documentary filmmaker, painter, and performance artist. Through her art and research, Salomeya's primary focus is on comprehending borderline states of mind and mental crisis. The basis of her creative method is documenting and analyzing the fluctuations of subjective reality and personal experience, woven into a historical spiral through painting and filmmaking. Salomeya's art pieces explore the opposition of the human and society in the context of feminism, separatism, integration, and the search for self-identification.
